Dear Alumni and Friends:

I want you all to know how incredibly grateful I am to everyone who has supported the students and programs of Arts and Sciences. For example, in the last year we raised almost \$140,000 through contributions to our scholarship and academic excellence funds. Thanks to your generosity, our students have been able to take advantage of the wonderful opportunities a Rutgers education offers. We have been able to expand our academic programs, provide support to students, and attract world-class faculty to our campus. All of us in Arts and Sciences appreciate the vote of confidence your support represents.

In the past few years, we have seen major growth and change throughout Arts and Sciences. Nearly 3,900 students are enrolled in the College of Arts and Sciences, University College, and the Graduate School, up from just over 3,400 in 1998. Our entering students now earn SAT scores at nearly 100 points above the national mean, with a mean score of 1125, up from 1070 six years ago. Our new Honors College continues to attract highly qualified students. Its entering class in Fall 2003 included sixty-four students, including a Rutgers University National Fellow, with an SAT score of 1530. Sixty-nine of our students have been inducted into Phi Beta Kappa since we were invited to become part of the Rutgers chapter in 2002. We have new programs at the graduate and undergraduate levels, from freshman seminars to electronic arts, from public health to industrial mathematics, from childhood studies to musical theater. Our three research centers – the Center for Children and Childhood Studies, the Center for State Constitutional Studies, and the Mid-Atlantic Regional Center for the Humanities – are thriving.

Our facilities have grown as well, and we hope to add even more new space in the near future, including new residence halls and new classrooms and offices for Arts and Sciences programs and faculty. We have plans for the expansion of University College and the Graduate School.

The next step in continuing this progress is a major endowment campaign that will get underway in the spring. The campaign will be linked to a dramatic new entryway to the campus from Cooper Street. We continue to count on our graduates and friends to support our programs and students. Your charitable gifts make an important difference in what we are able to accomplish.

As you consider your year-end tax planning, I hope you will consider making good use of your income tax charitable deduction. Your 2004 year-end gift can significantly reduce your income taxes, while providing meaningful support for our undergraduate and graduate programs in Arts and Sciences. I am deeply grateful for your gifts, which mean so much to all of us at Rutgers-Camden as you help us shape our future.

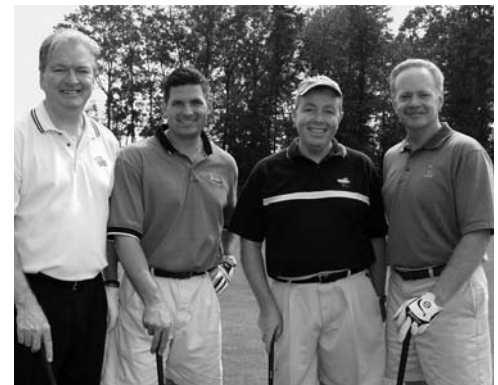

Dan Klepacki is the Manager of Procurement Operations at Public Service Enterprise Group (PSE&G). Since January 2004, Dan has been responsible for PSE&G's procurement function in support of Utility, Nuclear, Fossil, and Corporate purchases totaling \$1.5B annually. From 1997 to 2003, Dan directed the PSE&G Utility supply chain organization responsible for procurement, transportation, inventory, and warehousing in support of electric and gas field operations across New Jersey. Prior to 1997, Dan held a variety of engineering and management positions within PSE&G's Gas Delivery organization.



George Mamo (*immediate past chair*) has spent more than two decades in executive leadership positions with charitable and educational organizations, as well as in development enterprises that have taken him throughout the United States and around the world. Early in his career he directed a homeless shelter run by Central Atlanta Churches, an interracial coalition. In his next position, he spent 12 years as vice president of administration for Feed the Children, an international relief organization based in Oklahoma City. There, in 1995, he was thrust into the world spotlight when he coordinated the work of some 5,000 volunteers and the delivery of relief supplies to rescue workers following the bombing of the

federal building. In 1999, after a three-year stint as director of global human resources at Winrock International, an economic development agency headquartered in Arkansas, he became executive vice president and chief operating officer of the International Fellowship of Christians and Jews. A not-for-profit based in Chicago and Jerusalem, the Fellowship promotes understanding and cooperation between Jews and Christians, supporting grassroots advocacy on behalf of Israel and funding humanitarian projects in Israel, the former Soviet Union and other areas of poverty and distress. Mamo is a 1976 graduate of the Rutgers-Camden College of Arts and Sciences, and a 2004 inductee into the Rutgers Hall of Distinguished Alumni.



Chuck Mannella is the Director of Alumni Relations for the Rutgers-Camden campus. A lifelong resident of Southern New Jersey, Chuck has an extensive background in public service. He began his career in education, serving as Assistant to the Principal at Sterling Regional High School. He worked for the US House of Representatives as former Congressman Jim Florio's chief of staff and also worked for the NJ State Senate. Chuck served as executive director of the Camden County Democrat Committee, where he helped to develop and expand a network of active volunteers, managing several successful legislative campaigns. He also owned and operated his own businesses. Chuck received his

bachelor's degree in political science from Rutgers-Camden in 1970 and attended graduate school at Rutgers-New Brunswick. He was president of the KSU fraternity.



Camie Morrison currently serves as Director of Sponsored Research on the Camden Campus of Rutgers University. Prior to joining the Rutgers-Camden staff, she served as vice president of foundation management and charitable trust administration at the Bryn Mawr Trust Company. Previously, she served in a number of progressive capacities at First Union National Bank and its metro Philadelphia/New Jersey predecessor institutions. Camie received her bachelor's degree in accounting from Rutgers-Camden in 1978 and her MBA from Temple University in 1983. She also holds the Chartered Advisor in Philanthropy designation. She serves as a vice president of the Board of Directors for the Planned Giving Council of Greater Philadelphia, and chairs Leave A Legacy of Greater Philadelphia. In 2000, Camie

was named one of the 50 finest graduates of Rutgers-Camden in conjunction with the campus's 50th anniversary celebration. She also received the Encore Award from the Arts & Business Partnership of Southern New Jersey.



James H. Rhodes is the Director of Legislative Policy and Communications for AmeriHealth. Prior to this he served as confidential aide to the Camden County Board of Freeholders. Mr. Rhodes attended Rutgers University-Camden in the late 1970's as an active member of student government and campus life. He returned to the campus and completed his BA in Political Science in 1994. Jim continues to remain active in the health, county, and university communities, through many leadership positions including: President, Board of Trustees, Rutgers Camden Alumni Association; Member, Dean's Advisory Council, Rutgers University - Camden; Member, New Jersey Mandated Health Benefits

Advisory Commission; Member, New Jersey Health Data Commission; Treasurer, New Jersey Association of Health Plans; Member, Camden County Parks Department Boathouse Committee; Board Member, Larc School for Disabled Children & Adults; and Member, Camden County Workforce Investment Board.

A few years later, she attended a post baccalaureate pre-med program at the University of Pennsylvania. Wanda graduated from Temple University School of Medicine in 1984, and did her residency training in Obstetrics and Gynecology at Boston University and the University of Rochester. Currently she practices gynecology in Haddonfield, NJ and Philadelphia. Wanda is on the staff at Pennsylvania Hospital, and is a Clinical Assistant Professor of Ob/Gyn at the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine. In addition to having a private practice, Wanda is the Medical Student Course Coordinator for the

Department of Ob/Gyn at Pennsylvania Hospital.



Amy Sampson is a senior at Rutgers University-Camden majoring in Sociology and Urban Studies and minoring in Childhood Studies. She is the current President of the Student Governing Association and also serves on the Dean's Student Advisory Council. Other campus leadership roles have included the President and Treasurer of the Honors Student Organization, Vice President of the Honors College Advisory Board, Treasurer of the Urban Studies Association, and co-chair of the Honors College Orientation Committee. She has also taken part in two International Studies courses focusing on Northern Ireland and served as a student staff assistant on one. Through the urban studies department, Amy was named a Community Scholar Intern in the Fall of 2003 and was

chosen for the competitive New Jersey Department of Community Affairs Housing Scholars internship program in the summer of 2004, working with the Fairview Main Street program for both of these internships. Amy was inducted into the Athenaeum Honor Society during her junior year and has been recognized on the Dean's List every semester. She has also received several Honors College and campus leadership awards. After graduation in May, Amy is planning to attend graduate school for city and regional planning, applied sociology, or public policy and administration and enter into a career in city planning or community development.



Irv Shoemaker is a loyal Rutgers alum, having graduated from The College of Arts and Sciences at Rutgers-Camden in 1966 and Rutgers School of Law-Newark in 1969. He grew up in West Berlin and returned to Berlin after law school where he worked at the Law Office of Maressa and Console, ultimately becoming a partner. In 1975 he started his own law firm, the Law Office of Shoemaker and Borbe. Irv retired from the full-time practice of law in 2001. He enjoys staying involved with Rutgers alumni efforts, is an avid coin and antique collector, and can often be found spending time with his wife Roz, a retired school librarian, at their beach home in Cape May, NJ. Irv and Roz have just embarked upon a new

Dorothy Stanaitis - After graduating from University College-Camden, Dorothy joined the Camden Alumni Association and eventually became its president. She was named one of the Fifty Finest graduates of the Camden Campus during the 50th Anniversary Celebration and was recently invited to join the Advisory Committee of the developing Camden Writers House project.



Sandy J. Stewart graduated from the Rutgers-Camden College of Arts and Sciences in 1981 and the Graduate School-Camden in 1987. While working on his graduate degree, he began work in medical research at Thomas Jefferson Hospital and then the American Red Cross in Philadelphia. At the Department, Nyeema was responsible for state and federal grants and program management, research and policy analysis. She also acted as the program officer who oversaw the implementation of the 21st Century Community Learning Centers Program, a \$12.75M funded program through the *No Child Left Behind* Act, that provides funds

throughout the country to support expanded academic enrichment opportunities during out-of-school time hours for children attending low-performing schools.



Michael Willmann is the Chairman and CEO of WMSH Marketing Communications, Inc. in Haddonfield, NJ. Prior to forming WMSH Marketing Communications in 1997, he served for 12 years as Executive Vice President for Marketing of the Star Group and as Chairman of that firm's Plans Board, composed of the agency's senior managers. He is the Vice Chairman of the Arts and Business Partnership of Southern New Jersey, a member of the Board and Executive Committee of the Southern New Jersey Development Council, where he is Director of Policy and Programs, a Trustee of ArtPride/ New Jersey, a member of the Board and Executive Committee of the South Jersey Performing Arts Center, and a

member of the Board of the Greater Camden Partnership and Haddonfield Little League. As a member of the Rutgers Dean's Leadership Council, he has chaired the Rutgers CEO Forum since 2002. A graduate of Fordham University and the University of Pennsylvania Law School, he is admitted to practice before the Supreme Court of the United States.

Hall of Distinguished Alumni

George W. Mamo, CCAS 1976, was inducted into the Hall of Distinguished Alumni May 1, 2004. Mr. Mamo has spent his professional career working to make the world a better place. In 1995 he coordinated the work of thousands of volunteers and the delivery of relief supplies to rescue workers in the aftermath of the bombing of the Oklahoma City federal building. "George Mamo is a true citizen of the world," according to Margaret Marsh, Dean of FAS. "His selection to the Hall of Distinguished Alumni reflects his dedication and vision."

The Miriam Thomas Chaplin Endowed Scholarship

C. Edward Chaplin established the Miriam Thomas Chaplin Endowed Scholarship for a student majoring in English at Rutgers-Camden in honor of his mother's years of service as a member of the Rutgers-Camden faculty. Mr. Chaplin, a businessman, humanitarian, and community leader, sits on the Rutgers University Foundation Board of Overseers. His gift is a wonderful example of honoring a loved one and is one of only a handful of endowed scholarships created for students in Arts and Sciences. "Although I arrived after Dr. Chaplin retired," noted Dean Margaret Marsh, "I know that she is remembered as a much beloved and revered professor." According to Dean Marsh, "an endowed scholarship is a tremendous vote of confidence in the programs and direction of Arts and Sciences. We are so pleased that Mr. Chaplin created this scholarship to honor his mother."



Miriam Chaplin retired from the Education Department, which she served as chair, in 1997 and now lives in Hilton Head, SC. She is remembered as being dedicated to her students and a true leader in her profession. Dr. Chaplin served as President of the National Council of Teachers of English. She wrote and contributed to many books about the development of composition and reading skills. Her interest in the professional development of teachers led her to South Africa and the former Soviet Union. According to Dr. Chaplin, "the ability to read and write is every person's birthright."

Goodwin, of Goodwin Enterprises, established the Ethel Lawrence Scholarship at Rutgers-Camden as a way of honoring her achievements by assisting students pursuing careers in affordable housing, community service, or urban studies. Ethel Lawrence championed affordable housing in her hometown of Mount Laurel, leading to a landmark lawsuit in the state of New Jersey. A crusader for better housing for low and moderate income families, she served as President of the Fair Share Housing Development Corporation until her death in 1994.

A graduate of Drexel University, Mr. Goodwin enjoyed success in his building business and served as a leader of local, state, and national professional associations. He devotes considerable time to working on behalf of a variety of philanthropic causes, including the United Way of Burlington County, the Jewish Community Center of Southern New Jersey, the National Liberty Museum in Philadelphia, and the American Friends of Neve Shalom/Wahat al-Salam.
