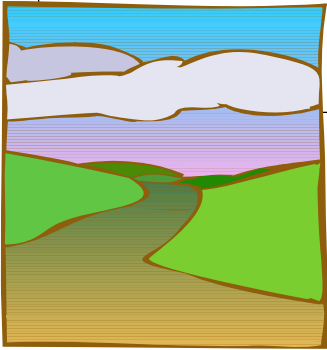


Pathways to Success: A Guide to Rutgers-Camden For First Year Students



This guide contains information for entering students in the College of Arts and Sciences

and University College. It includes information about which campus offices you should contact for assistance, as well information about academic and co-curricular opportunities.

Registering for classes:

You can register for classes online, but should be sure to consult with your academic advisor to be sure that you are selecting courses that are appropriate for your academic progress. Advance registration takes place in November for the spring term and in early April for the fall term - this is the best time to register for courses for the next semester. Degree Navigator:

Degree Navigator is an online system that allows you to track your progress toward your degree. You can check whether you have met general education and major requirements. Academic Advising:

Undergraduate students work with academic advisors to register for classes, discuss majors and minors, change schedules, and stay on schedule to complete the course requirements for their degree programs. Once students in the College of Arts and Sciences and University College have selected their major, they should seek advice from their departmental advisor. Students who declare a business major are advised by an academic advisor in the School of Business.

Checking Grades and Dean's List:

In order to check grades, you must have your NetID and your password. You can then log on to the system found at: <https://www.acs.rutgers.edu/grades> and check your grades and schedule.

The Dean's List recognizes current academic achievement. The list is published at the end of each term for full-time students and in August for part-time students. Full-time students are eligible if they have completed 12 or more credits for numerical grade credit with a term grade-point average of 3.5 or better. Part-time students are eligible if during the previous academic year they have completed 12 or more credits for numerical grade credit with a grade-point average of 3.5 or better.

A Bachelor's Degree includes the following:

1. **General Requirements (often referred to as General Education or gen eds)** - these are a set of courses covering a broad array of courses and subjects, designed to give students a well rounded education and to expose them to many areas of the curriculum - include writing, math, foreign language, social science, humanities, science and diversity requirements. NOTE: for Business students these are included in the pre-business and general education requirements. Usually about 16 courses or 48 credits.
2. **Major requirements** - these are the courses that are required for your major. They will be made up largely of the subject of your major, but may include some required courses in related subjects as well. There also may be some pre-major requirements (courses needed before you can take some of your major courses, also called prerequisites). This is especially common in nursing, business, and some of the sciences. Usually about 10-14 courses, or 30+ credits. Students can major in one or more subjects.
3. **Electives** - there are courses that do not fill a specific requirement, but rather add to the breadth of your education. Many students select a minor in one or more fields. This option allows students to study an additional area without taking as many courses as are required for a major. We offer minors within departments and in interdisciplinary programs. Usually about 6 courses or 18 credits.
4. **Total number of credits/courses** — The minimum number of credits needed to graduate is 120 - which is about 40 courses.



NOTE: Some courses can count for multiple requirements above, but the credits count only once and you must earn at least 120 credits to graduate. Information about various requirements and checklists for general education, majors, and minors can be found at:

Declaring a Major:

Once you have explored a variety of academic subjects, you can begin to focus on the one area in which you'd like to concentrate your studies and declare your major in that field. To declare a major, go to Registrar's Office (first floor of Armitage Hall) and complete the appropriate form. If you had indicated a major at the time of application, it is indicated in your academic record; if you wish to change your major, you can do this at the Registrar's Office.

Please note that once you have declared a major, you should see your departmental advisor for guidance about what courses to take and other academic matters.

First Year Seminars:

First Year Seminars at Camden offer entering students who are making the transition to college the chance to be in a small class and to satisfy a core graduation requirement. These seminars help first year students develop their



skills in academic writing and critical thinking. Their goals include providing you with skills and knowledge that will contribute to your success in college at Rutgers and to help students make

appropriate transitions to college. All the introductory composition courses will serve as first year seminars and you will be able to select additional seminars in other academic areas.

Undergraduate Research and Creative Activity:

At Rutgers-Camden, undergraduates can take advantage of multiple opportunities to conduct research or engage in creative activity with our faculty. Our faculty members willingly include students in their own research or creative projects or serve as mentors for independent projects. Faculty members frequently invite students to work with them in the discovery or creative process, so students have the chance to develop ideas that will shape the 21st century.

We offer grants to support undergraduate research and creative activity. As you are taking classes, you should think about whether you might wish to engage in a research or creative project under the guidance of our faculty. Academic Integrity:

Academic integrity is a hallmark of higher education. It means that any work submitted by an individual is that student's own work and that work informed by the efforts of others gives appropriate credit to them.



There are several possible violations of academic integrity. The descriptions below are excerpted directly from the *Policy on Academic Integrity for Undergraduate and Graduate Students*, which can be found at the website below along with an explanation of the consequences of violating this policy. Academic integrity is taken very seriously by our faculty and administration, so you should be sure that you do not violate this policy; doing so can have serious consequences. Always ask your professors or the reference librarians if you are not sure how to proceed.

A. Cheating — Cheating is the use of inappropriate and unacknowledged materials, information, or study aids in any academic exercise. Assistance from other people is restricted or forbidden unless explicitly authorized by the instructor for particular assignments. ... Similarly, students must not request others (including commercial term paper companies) to conduct research or prepare any work for them or use work or research prepared by others.

B. Fabrication — Fabrication is the falsification or invention of any information or citation in an academic exercise. "Invented" information may not be used in any laboratory experiment or other academic exercise without authorization from the instructor. ... The student must also acknowledge reliance upon the actual source from which cited information was obtained.

C. Facilitating Academic Dishonesty — Students who knowingly or negligently allow their work to be used by other students or who otherwise aid others in academic dishonesty are violating academic integrity. Such students are as guilty of intellectual dishonesty as the student who receives the material even though they may not themselves benefit academically from that dishonesty.

D. Plagiarism — Plagiarism is the representation of the words or ideas of another person or source as one's own in any academic exercise. To avoid plagiarism, every direct quotation must be identified by quotation marks or by appropriate indentation and must be properly cited in the text or in a footnote. Acknowledgment is also required when material from another source stored in print, electronic, or other medium is paraphrased or summarized in whole or in part in one's own words. ... Plagiarism can, in some cases, be a subtle issue. Any questions or doubts about what constitutes plagiarism should be discussed with the faculty member.

E. Denying others access to information or material — It is a violation of academic integrity to deny others access to scholarly resources, or to deliberately impede the progress of another student or scholar. Examples of offenses of this type include: giving other students false or misleading information; making library material unavailable to others by stealing or defacing books or journals, or by deliberately misplacing or destroying reserve materials; or altering computer files that belong to another.

The Summer Session Program offers courses during the summer months. Several sessions are offered to fit a variety of schedules. Classes are offered during

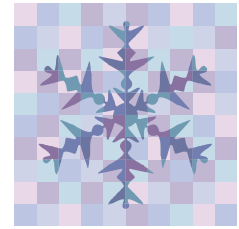

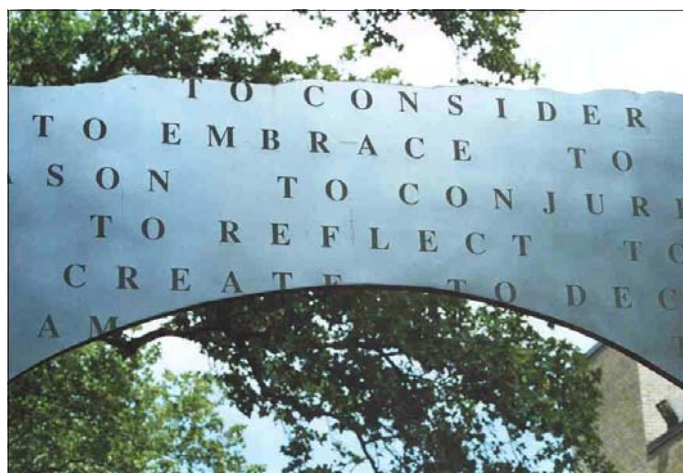


Campus Activities:
